## Year in Review Highlights

### **Children's Advocacy Center Grand Opening in April 2017**

The Children's Advocacy Center moved to a newly remodeled 3,000 square foot building at 711 Benton Avenue, Brooksville. The new center allows for much needed additional space to house the various members of the Child Protection Team and local assisting agencies.

### **Community Services addition of a Veterans Case Manager**

In line with MFCS's Strategic Plan, in April 2017 the Community Services department added a Veteran Case Manager to the staff to address the growing needs of our veterans.

### **Trans Hernando extended transportation hours and incorporated a \$1.00 veteran ride program, which has** increased veteran ridership by 300%.

### **Community Services New Hudson Office August 2017**

The Community Services LIHEAP office moved from Spring Hill to their new Hudson Office.

### **Award of Early Head Start Funding for 2017-18**

This funding provides for the addition of classes for ages 0 - 2 in Hernando and Volusia Counties.

### **Children's Advocacy Center Purse Bingo Fund-raiser September 2017**

The 4th Annual Purse Bingo fund-raiser was a success again, raising close to \$30,000.

### **ROMA Certified Trainers**


Members of MFCS staff have been working towards achieving ROMA Certified Trainer status, a highly sought out certification in Community Action.



### Success story with James Norton

Several years ago James Norton's wife, Eden, overheard someone talking about the local Head Start program and was interested in getting involved. Eden called and received more information, applied, and her child was accepted and enrolled.

Since then, James and Eden have now had 3 of their children in the Head Start program. One of their children is still attending Head Start at our Malloy center in Volusia. James has been a very involved parent during his children's time at Head Start and he has been an active member of the Policy Council. He was president of the school for two years, and attended every parent engagement activity and field trip.

Unfortunately, James is no longer able to attend so many meetings and be as involved, however; it is for a very good reason. James has recently received a promotion and is currently a Manager at Denny's in Deland. James received his first job in the food industry at Bob Evans working as a busser. He then went on to become a cook after a few years of hard work. He has also spent time as a chef at the prison and served time in the Army.



James enjoys his job because he likes having the opportunity to make people happy. James says if he could offer any advice to any other Head Start parents who are wanting to be promoted to management, he would say, "Don't give up! You don't always make it your first run around but keep your chin up."

James is happy for the ways in which Head Start has helped look after his children. He says that the way the Family Advocates have taken care of his sick children and going out of their way to assist them, has really touched his family. It is through the continual support in the Head Start community that he feels he has been helped to embrace his new position.

## Changing Lives.



Ms. Martha is 96 and was at risk of nursing home placement. She is a twin who grew up on a farm in Illinois. Being an independent person, she went to college, then worked as a receptionist for the Governor. Ms. Martha was also a dancer and danced with the theater. Ms. Martha has a dog that is her pride and joy, which she would not be able to take with her if she was placed in a nursing home.

Ms. Martha is very satisfied with the services she receives through Mid-Florida Community Services, she loves her case manager and her aide. She is glad to have MFCS assistance which enables her to stay in her home.

### HOME CARE FOR THE ELDERLY (HCE)

This program provides a monthly stipend to Seniors to utilize at their discretion for purchases to address their daily needs.

### CONGREGATE MEAL SITES

These sites offer free nutritious meals to Seniors as well as an opportunity for social interaction.

### MEALS ON WHEELS

A home meal delivery service that delivers quality food daily to Seniors who otherwise may not have access to healthy, nutritious meals.

### RESPIRE CARE

Provides a break to allow Caregivers of Seniors to conduct personal business (i.e. shopping, hair care, socialization, etc.)

### COMMUNITY CARE FOR THE ELDERLY (CCE)

This is a program where Seniors are assigned to a Case Manager who routinely assesses and address their personal health, nutrition and homecare needs.

### ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE INITIATIVE (ADI)

This program serves clients of all ages and provides respite care to caregivers of those struggling with the disease.

### PETS ON WHEELS

This is a home delivery service that delivers dog/cat food to Seniors in effort to prevent them from sharing human food with their pets due to financial struggles.



The CAC Provides trauma-focused therapy and other counseling services to child victims and their non-offending family members to begin the healing process.*

## Changing Lives.

A child told her school resource officer that her father was sexually abusing her and that she had evidence to prove it. They called the Sheriff's Office Major Crimes division and a detective arranged to have the child immediately brought to the Children's Advocacy Center for evidence collection. After the interview, law enforcement issued a warrant for the father. Dad committed suicide.

Our therapist was sent that evening to the child's foster care placement site to break the news to her. The therapist was immediately able to provide trauma focused therapy

and deescalate any suicidal ideations. This built a rapport between the therapist and the victim, who is doing very well despite the circumstances. She comes to therapy weekly, is attending school, and has mostly good days versus bad days.





Beginning in June 2017, Trans Hernando started offering rides to our Veteran’s and their spouses for only \$1.00 each way. ## Breakdown of Trips Provided



*The Weatherization Assistance Program services are designed to reduce energy costs by improving energy efficiency in the home while also addressing the health and safety conditions. Services are provided to eligible low-income homeowners, with priority given to those who are 60 years or older, families with disabilities, and/or families with children 12 years and younger.*



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
